Collect

Great and loving God, your will for us in your Son Jesus is the peace which the world cannot give, your abiding gift, the Advocate he promised. Calm all troubled hearts, dispel every fear, and keep us steadfast in love and faithful to your word. Grant this through Jesus Christ, the firstborn from the dead, who lives with you now and always in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

First reading (Acts 16: 9–15)

During the night Paul had a vision:

there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, 'Come over to Macedonia and help us.'

When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river,

where we supposed there was a place of prayer;

and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there.

A certain woman named Lydia, a worshipper of God, was listening to us;

she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth.

The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul.

When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying,

'If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home.' And she prevailed upon us. Psalm 67 – 8:00 a.m.

May God be merciful to us and bless us, show us the light of his countenance and come to us.

Let your ways be known upon earth, your saving health among all nations. **R**

SECOND READING

(Revelation 21:10-14, 22-22:5)

In the spirit the angel carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. It has the glory of God and a radiance like a very rare jewel, like jasper, clear as crystal. It has a great, high wall with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates are inscribed the names of the twelve tribes of the Israelites; on the east three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. And the wall of the city has twelve foundations, and on them are the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb....

I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. People will bring into it the glory and the honour of the nations.

But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practises abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations.

Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

GOSPEL

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. You heard me say to you, "I am going away, and I am coming to you." If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe.'

REFLECTION ON THE LECTIONS

It has been interesting that, in the year of Luke our gospel readings, over these last few Sundays, have come from the gospel of John. What is especially interesting about that is the readings have come from Jesus' 'Farewell Discourse': that is, the words Jesus says (in John's gospel) to the disciples on the night he was betrayed, arrested and taken to the sham trial before the High Priests, Annas and Caiaphas. In other words, in this season of Easter, when we celebrate the Resurrection, the gospel readings have taken us back to the night of Maundy Thursday, with the looming death of Jesus.

What might be going on here? One possible explanation is given in today's gospel: "I have said these things to you while I am still with you," Jesus says. "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." For Jesus' disciples in Malvern today, perhaps we, too, need to be 'reminded' of the things Jesus said, to hear them again, and to be led to reflect and understand them more deeply through the action of God the Holy Spirit – the Advocate or Comforter (as John's word, *Paraklete* is usually translated!). Reflecting on that further, it means that this and every week in this Easter season, the gospel – and all the readings – are read in the light of the Paschal Candle, as we literally did at the Easter Vigil. That is, that the full glory and wisdom of the readings we hear can only be understood in the light of the Risen Christ.

Furthermore, in other readings (certainly today, and last week) we hear of the action of that *Paraklete*, the Advocate, the Holy Spirit. Last week and today, we hear of the Holy Spirit driving Peter and Paul to completely new and different places and people of ministry. The same Spirit is also at work (in both instances) preparing Cornelius and Lydia to hear and respond to the message the apostles bring. It is also 'in the spirit' that an angel brings John to see the vision of the new Jerusalem coming down out of heaven. He hears that the city is alight with the glory of God and the Lamb; and, as we heard last week, that is because God chooses to make God's home 'among mortals'.

The literal translation of *Paraklete* is 'the one who comes alongside' – and 'Advocate' works because we know that (for instance) a legal 'advocate' stands alongside someone in court. But 'Comforter' gets something of the word too – because the standing alongside is to offer help and assistance. However we translate it, the word John uses in the gospel points to the same thing we see in Revelation: God the Creator of all, firstly in Jesus and then in the Holy Spirit, comes to be with people, to dwell with us. And, as the readings in Acts make clear, the work of the Holy Spirit keeps expanding our understanding, our views of what sorts of people God chooses to dwell with and stand alongside. In short, with all people.

This is a vision that the people of Israel also had. Hence the psalm reminds us that 'the *nations*', not just Israel, 'will be glad and sing for joy, and that '*all the people* will praise God.' Or, as Revelation puts it. 'the nations will walk by [the heavenly city's] light'.

As we 'revisit' Jesus' words from the night before he died, but living in the time after his resurrection, we are reminded of God's remarkable plan for the reconciliation of the whole creation. We are also reminded of our own calling, as those who follow the risen Lord: to rejoice in the gift of the Holy Spirit, to allow the Spirit to lead us continually out of our more narrow and fixed way of viewing the world and other people, and into the wonderful breadth and depth of God's eternal, expansive coming to be alongside and dwell with the creation created, saved and loved to all eternity.
