THE FEAST OF PENTECOST (ALSO KNOWN AS WHITSUNDAY)



June 8, 2025 10:00 a.m. The original of the icon on the cover of today's Order of Service was painted towards the end of the fifteenth century. It is known as '*The Descent of the Holy Spirit*'. As with all Christian icons the Pentecost icon aims to bring us into the reality of the event depicted. The following are reflections on the symbolism and meaning of this icon.

First, the virgin Mary stands at the top of the icon, thus symbolising her important place in this feast. She is dressed in softly flowing magenta and blue robes which are typical colours used for her. The position of the other figures represents harmony, in which no apostle is depicted as being better than another. The inverse perspective prevents those near the back of the semicircle from being painted as smaller figures. Peter and Paul as the chief apostles are shown slightly larger. They are on the same level. The four evangelists hold books symbolizing the writings of the four gospels, and the remainder hold scrolls which show that even those who did not write gospels still proclaimed the gospel message to the world.

The calm ambience in this icon stands in contrast to the Pentecost story itself. There is no discord or chaos. In Acts 2:1-11 we read about a sudden sound from heaven, as of a violent wind, tongues of fire, words spoken in different languages, and of bewildered amazement. There is nothing shown in this icon that resembles these features: no sounds, no words, no speaking disciple, no excited crowd. What we see is complete tranquility of harmony and order. Thus, it is the deeper meaning of Pentecost that the iconographer wanted to express. The top of the semicircle of apostles is empty because this is the seat of Jesus, who is invisibly present. Jesus said before his ascension that he is with us always. And we know that Jesus continues to keep that promise being invisibly present yet guiding us through the Holy Spirit. Each of the twelve apostles are seated in slightly separate ways. All are depicted with an individual halo (nimbus), showing their holiness. Few are looking at each other or collaborating with each other. It is not their common psychological make-up nor human engagement that unites them. These men have not come together because of their compatibility. What binds them together in unity are the rays of the Spirit descending from above.

The figure at the bottom of the icon, known as *Cosmos*, represents the peoples of the world. Henri Nouwen wrote that he is sitting 'in darkness and the shadow of death' (Luke 1:79). Such ugliness violates the elegant Pentecost scene. Furthermore, Nouwen also suggests that such an insertion in the icon is important because 'Pentecost is not the beautiful end of the salvation story, but the beginning of a mission to go out into the world, make disciples of all nations, baptize them ... [and] observe all the commands that Jesus gave us' (Matthew 28:19-20).

The Spirit of truth comes to convict of sin, of righteousness, and of judgement.

Silence is kept.

Let us then open our hearts and confess our sins in penitence and faith.

Merciful God,

our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word and deed, and in what we have failed to do: we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent, and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us. Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant pronounces absolution, to which all respond:

Amen.

We sing together

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Let us pray.

The people pray silently, and then the Celebrant 'collects' the silent prayer:

O God, who in smoke and fire upon Mount Sinai gave the law to Moses, and who revealed the new covenant in the fire of the Spirit: grant, we pray, that, kindled by that same Spirit which you poured forth upon your apostles, we may fulfil with joy your commandment of love. We ask this through Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked,

'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.'

All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said,

'They are filled with new wine.' But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them:

'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning.

No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

"In the last days it will be, God declares,

that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,

and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions,

and your old men shall dream dreams.

Even upon my slaves, both men and women,

in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father [and the Son], who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy Catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Celebrant continues with the prayer, concluding with:

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The Celebrant continues the prayer until:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died, Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

A brief silence is kept.

Being made one by the power of the Spirit, as our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven,

hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

As the Celebrant breaks the bread, the following is said:

As this broken bread was once many grains which have been gathered together and made one bread.

So may your Church be gathered from the ends of the earth into your kingdom.

We sing together:

Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us your peace.

Alleluia! Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us. **Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!**

Communion is distributed.

During Communion, the choir sings the following anthem:

Strong and weak, women and men tell out your word; the young receive visions, the old receive dreams. With the new wine of the Spirit they proclaim your reign of love. Amid the birth pangs of the new creation the way of light is made known. Source of freedom, giver of life, blessed are you, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All Blessed be God for ever.

For fifty days we have celebrated the victory of our Lord Jesus Christ over the powers of sin and death.

We have proclaimed God's mighty acts

and we have prayed that the power that was at work when God raised Jesus from the dead might be at work in us.

As part of God's Church here in Malvern, I call upon you to live out what you proclaim.

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, will you dare to walk into God's future, trusting him to be your guide?

All By the Spirit's power, we will.

Will you dare to embrace each other and grow together in love?

All We will.

Will you dare to share your riches in common and minister to each other in need?

All We will.

Will you dare to pray for each other until your hearts beat with the longings of God?

All We will.

Will you dare to carry the light of Christ into the world's dark places?

All We will.

The Paschal Candle is then extinguished in silence, before the Celebrant pronounces the blessing:

May the Spirit, who hovered over the waters when the world was created, breathe into you the life he gives.

Amen.

who overshadowed the Virgin when the eternal Son came among us, make you joyful in the service of the Lord.

Amen.

May the Spirit,

who set the Church on fire on the Day of Pentecost, bring the world alive with the love of the risen Christ. Amen.

And the blessing of God Almighty... **Amen.**
