

REFLECTIONS ON THE LECTIONS

On this last Sunday of the Church year, we keep the Feast of Christ the King (or the Reign of Christ, or 'Jesus Christ our Universal King', to use its more formal title). It is a relatively recent and modern feast – recent, at least, in church history. It was introduced for observance by Pope Pius XI in 1925. It began to spread more widely after the Second World War and made its way to Anglican and other churches in the 1960s and 70s.

Given the 'speed' at which innovation and change comes to the Church ("Like a mighty tortoise, moves the Church of God; brothers, sisters we are treading where we have already trod", as the hymn parody has it), this observance was a response to the horrors witnessed not only in World War I, but in the claims made by various governments in the names of the kings and emperors of Europe in the origins of that conflict. At the time, Pope Pius was also somewhat concerned by the Italian political scene, and the rise of Mussolini – II Duce (which is simply Italian, as Führer is German, for the Leader), as he styled himself. The Pope wished to draw attention to a vision of a different kind of leadership from that the world had experienced through the dreadful bloodbath of the War; and from what he, and others, were beginning to see emerging in Italy. The call was for the Church to recall the mode of leadership, lordship, rule the Lord Jesus offered.

The readings we hear today reveal clearly the contrast offered between Jesus as King, and what we all-too often see as models of leadership in political and other elements of life. As we saw during Holy Week, John is determined to present Jesus as a triumphant king – so that, in John's account of the Passion, Jesus carries his own cross to Golgotha, while still wearing the purple robe placed on him in mockery. John is also at pains, as he has Jesus tell Pilate, to make clear that the kind of kingship and kingdom that Jesus has and proclaims is 'not from this world' (John 18:36). As well as the obvious meaning, John's Greek also implies, 'my kingdom is not a kingdom as the world understands that word'. Again as we saw in Holy Week, the dramatic and ironic contrast John draws between Jesus and Pilate, the putative representative of worldly power, is telling. While Pilate rushes in and out, Jesus stands (in T. S. Eliot's words) as 'the still point of the turning world'.

The readings from Daniel and Revelation (the latter a *midrash* or reworking of the passage in Daniel) also reveal the difference in this kind of kingship or dominion and power. From Daniel, we discover that never failing power and dominion is given – not, as Daniel's readers might expect – to some mythical and terrifying beast, but to one who appears as a human being; or, in a more literal translation, a Son of Man. (We can see why the Church has always gone to this passage). Revelation makes clear not only that the dominion is given to a human one, but to one who has been pierced and is 'firstborn from the dead'. Again, this is not quite the image of power and dominion Roman emperors would have wanted to project. Above all, these three readings make abundantly clear, this dominion and power and glory is a shared kingship. The Ancient One, the Alpha and the Omega, the Lord hands over power and rule to the one who has been pierced – who has allowed himself to be 'handed over' to those who think they have great power. As followers of this king, citizens of this kingdom, let us strive to recognize this self-giving and -offering as the sign of true leadership, and give thanks for the ruler who calls us into this kingdom of peace.

GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

Setting: Christ Church Mass Philip Matthias

We sing hymn 228 (vv. 1, 3 & 6)

President: Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Lord, have mercy. Christ, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Let us pray.

The people pray silently, and then the President 'collects' the silent prayer:

Everlasting God, whose will is to restore all things in your well-beloved Son, our Lord and King: grant that the people of earth, now divided and enslaved by sin, may be freed and brought together under his gentle and loving rule; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now ever and for ever. **Amen**.

The President continues the prayer until:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.
